

This is our Dance of the Month for March chosen by Eleanor Rayden	
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1- 8 9-16 17-24 25-32	1s cross RH & cast 1 place, 1s cross RH & cast 1 place (Man up Lady down) 1s dance ½ reels of 3 across (1M with 2s & 1L with 3s), set in lines across & change places RH with opposite person 2s+1s+3s chase clockwise, 1s dance for 4 steps & turn RH to face 1 st corner positions as 2s & 3s continue to chase back to place (as bar 16) 1s dance ½ reel of 4 with 1 st corners, passing RSh dance ½ reel with 2 nd corners & cross passing RSh to 2 nd place own sides

1- 8 9-16 17-24 25-32	1M casts to 2 nd place, sets to 3L, turns RH & dances back to 2 nd place on own side 1L casts to 2 nd place, sets to 3M, turns LH & dances back to 2 nd place 1L with 2s & 1M with 3s dance RH across, 1s end in centre LH joined, 1s set in centre & dance out to 2 nd place on opposite sides 1M with 2s & 1L with 3s dance RH across, 1s end in centre LH joined, 1s set in centre & dance out to 2 nd place on own sides

1- 8 9-16 17-24	1s cross RH, cast to 2 nd place & dance ½ Fig of 8 round 2s 1s+3s dance RH across & LH back 1L followed by 3L dance Tandem reel of 3 across with 2s while 3M followed by 1M reel of 3 with 4s (1s and in 3 rd place)		

PELORUS JACK (J8x32)

of 3 with 4s (1s end in 3rd place)

1s+4s dance ½ R&L & turn partners RH 1½ times

Barry Skelton RSCDS Book 41

- 1-8 1s cross RH, cast 1 place & dance RH across with 3s, 1s end with Man facing his 1st corner with his partner behind him
- 1s dance Alternating Tandem ½ reel of 3 with 1st corners & Alternating Tandem ½ reel 9-16 with 2nd corners
- 1s dance Alternating Tandem ½ reels of 3 with Ladies 1st corner (position) & then with 17-24 Ladies 2nd corner (position)
- 1M followed by partner dance into LH across with 2s, 1s retain LH & 1/2 turn to own 25-32 sides, 2s+1s+3s set

- 1-8 1s turn 2H & remain in middle facing each other **as** 2s step up, 1s+2s set (1s advancing & pass LSh to face opposite partner) & dance ½ reel of 4 across with 2s with 1s ending reel giving LH to face down on own side between 2s
- 9-16 1s dance down to end between 3s & face each other, 1s+3s set (1s advancing & pass LSh to face opposite partner) & ½ reel of 4 across with 3s 1s end giving LH to face up on own side between 3s
- 17-24 1s lead up to top, cross over & cast to 2nd place & ½ reels of 3 across (L with 2s & M with 3s)
- 25-32 2s+1s dance Diamond Poussette

PLANTATION REEL (R5x32)

Tony Moretti Pinewoods Collection II

- 1-8 1s & 3s cross RH & cast down 1 place, lead down between the couple below & cast back to 2nd/4th place (opposite sides)
- 9-16 2s+1s & 4s+3s dance ½ R&L, & Petronella 2 places anti-clockwise round square (end in same places as at bar 8)
- All dance RH across (1M with 2s, 1L+3M with 4s, 3L with 5s) & 1s & 3s change places with partners to dance LH across
- 25-32 1s & 3s cross RH cast down 1 place & all turn RH

FATHER CONNELLY'S JIG (J4x64)

John Drewry Donside Book

This was our Dance of the Month for February chosen by Mandy Baxter

- **1-8** 1s+2s Set+Rotate
- 9-16 1s dance ½ diagonal R&L with 1st corners while 2nd corners set & change places diagonally RH, 1s dance ½ reels of 3 on opposite sides
- 17-24 1s dance ½ diagonal R&L with 3rd corner **while** 1st corner persons set & change places diagonally, 1s dance ½ reels of 3 on own sides
- 25-32 1s dance reels of 3 across Lady with 2s & Man with 3s
- 1s cross down between 3s, 1L casts up round 3M & 1M casts down round 4L, 1s change places LH in centre & cast to 3rd place own sides
- **41-56** 3s+1s+4s (bottom 3 couples) repeat bars 9-24
- 57-64 All (or bottom 3 couples only) circle 8(6)H round & back

THE ELEPHANT'S STAMPEDE (J4x48) Sq.Set

This was Stamford's "Challenge the Teacher" Dance, but not only did she rise to the challenge, 2 sets of very mixed experience dancers danced it to the end!

- 1-8 All circle 8H round & back
- 9-16 1s+3s advance & with free hand join with 2s & 4s & retire into longwise set across the dance, all dance ½ parallel reels of 4 across
- All dance ½ R&L at each end of set, turn (person on Man's left) RH 1½ times to form square set
- 25-32 All Ladies petronella turn to next Ladies place to right & set, repeat to meet partner (all have progressed 1 place to right)
- 33-48 All dance full Schiehallion Reel

Learning new formations – we had Espagnole, Tandem Reels, Diamond Pousette and Set & Rotate in the first half, and in this half, Petronella in Tandem, Set & Link, Poussette, Double Triangles, Allemande and Hello-Goodbye setting!

CHERRYBANK GARDENS (S3x32)

John Drewry Bankhead Book 1

- 1-8 1s+2s set & Petronella-in-tandem twice to end with 2s+1s on opposite sides having changed places
- 9-16 2s+1s set & 2s cross RH & 1s LH, 1L dances RH across with 2s & 1M with 3s
- 17-24 1s+3s Set+Link & circle 4H round to left
- 25-32 2s+3s+1s dance Grand Chain (2s crossing to commence)

The Cherrybank Gardens, to the west of Perth, was home to Europe's largest collections of heathers (over 900 varieties, on 7 acres), known as "The Bell's National Heather Collection". In addition, visitors could see the Pride of Perth Exhibition, which illustrates the story of Perth from mediaeval times to the present day. The garden was created in 1984 by Bell's whisky distilling company, whose headquarters once lay adjacent, and in 2002 the garden was gifted to Scotland's Garden Trust and provided their headquarters. In March 2004 the Trust announced their intention to develop an adjacent site into a £30 million National Garden for Scotland named The Calyx. Disappointment followed in 2007 when the project failed to gain the required lottery funding and the Gardens closed down completely soon afterwards.

ROBERT'S RANT (R8x32)

Sheila Trafford Newcastle 70th Anniversary

- 1-8 1s cross RH, cast (2s step up); 1s cross LH & cast Left to end 1L between 2s facing down, 1M between 3s facing up
- 9-12 1s dance ½ diagonal R&L (1s go to right up/down)
- 13-16 1s dance ½ RSh reel of 3 across (1M at top facing own side, 1L at bottom facing own side to start)
- 17-24 1s repeat 9-16, ending 1L between 2s at top, 1M between 3s at bottom
- 25-28 All chase clockwise ½way
- 29-32 1s Petronella turn to 2nd place own side & all 3 couples set 2 1 3

FERGUS McIVER or WAVERLEY (J8x48)

Button & Whittaker (1812) RSCDS Book 15

- 1-8 1L followed by 2L +3L cross & dance down behind 1+2+3M cross & dance back to places
- 9-16 1M+2M+3M repeat dancing round behind Ladies back to place
- 17-24 1M+2M also 1L+2L, set to each other & change places RH, set & change back LH
- 25-32 1s+2s dance Poussette, 1s end BtoB in centre facing own sides for Double Triangles
- 1s dance Double Triangles & end side by side facing out on Ladies side between 2L+3L
- 1s lead out between 2L+3L, cast L up & M down, meet in middle & lead out between 2M+3M, 1s cast as before & end in 2nd place own sides

- **1-8** 1s+2s dance Allemande 2 1 3 4
- **9-16** All dance reflection reels of 4 on sides (2s & 3s out & down to start)
- 17-24 1s+3s dance RH across & end with 1s casting to 3rd place as 3s dance up, 1s+4s
 - dance LH across & end with 1s casting to 4th place as 4s dance up
- 25-32 All dance down closing in to meet partner & lead up RH back to places 2 3 4 1

Calum MacLeod was born in 1911. He was brought up and spent his life in Arnish, a small sheltered township in the north of Raasay. Calum MacLeod was accustomed to deserted settlements.

When Calum was a young man, in 1931, the 100 people who lived in his neighbourhood petitioned Inverness County Council for a motor road to connect them to the south of Raasay. Their request was denied. And so people continued to walk and sail away from the forgotten dwellings of northern Raasay.

The house on Eilean Tigh was abandoned. The families from Kyle Rona left. The fertile satellite island of Fladda emptied. The people of Torran went south. The school and post office closed. By the late 1960s, just two people remained in the whole of northern Raasay from the 100 who had petitioned Inverness County Council for a road in 1931. Those two people were Calum MacLeod and his wife, Lexie.

On a spring morning in the 1960s, Calum MacLeod placed into his homemade wooden wheelbarrow a pick, an axe, a shovel and a lunchbox. He trundled this cargo south from his crofthouse door, down the familiar, narrow rutted bridle path, up and down rough hillsides, along the edge of hazardous cliff-faces, through patches of bent and stunted hazel and birch and over quaking peatbogs.

After almost two miles he reached the official, adopted tarmacadamised council road. There he stopped and turned to face homewards. Before him and to his left were steep banks of bracken, turf, birch and hazel. To his right, green pastureland rolled down to the sea.

Then, alone in an empty landscape, Calum MacLeod began to build a road. He started by widening his workspace. He cleared the scattered clumps of wind-blasted native woodland which lay on either side of the old track. He chopped the dwarf trees down and he then dug up their roots. He gathered the detritus carefully into piles at the edge of his planned route. He worked a long day. And at the end of that first long day, when he reassembled his equipment in the wheelbarrow and began his walk home, he had denuded several yards of ground. He had, in fact, accomplished slightly more than one 2000th of a task which would take him almost 20 years to complete, which would pay him not a material penny and would cost him little more, but which would leave his manifesto marked in stone upon his people's land.

Calum MacLeod's road to northern Raasay was surveyed, adopted and tarmacadamed by the council at Inverness in 1982. It was a single-track highway, but it had 20 passing places to permit the safe transit of northbound and southbound traffic. "I am very pleased indeed," said Calum. "They have done a very good job." He chuckled. "It'll be like an autobahn when they've finished. Mind you, they have not had to change an inch of the lines. I had an Australian science master over here this year and he said that, considering the terrain, the lines of the road were the finest example of scientific engineering he had seen!"

- 1-8 1s dance down below 3s, cast up round 3s to 2nd place own side, 2s+1s+3s set & cross RH
- 9-16 1s dance up round 2s & cast down to 2nd place opposite sides, 2s+1s+3s set, 1s turn LH to face 1st corners **while** 2s & 3s cross LH
- 17-24 1s dance 'Hello-Goodbye' setting with 1st corners & ¾ turn RH to face 2nd corners, 1s dance 'Hello-Goodbye' setting to 2nd corners & ¾ turn RH to end 2nd place own side
- **25-32** 2s+1s+3s circle 6H round & back
